

# Jamborees Coming in September & October


Begin preparations now for these exciting days.

### News From The Pews

#### "TESS" Team Energized by Their Work & Witness Trip to the Gulf

"Here's a broom; start sweeping the gym!" We looked at the floor, divided into small rectangles that would be our space for the next week. What a welcome to Pascagoula, Mississippi!

What was to follow for the 39 TESS'ers (Teens Engulfed in the Spirit of Service) would be a power-packed week of giving and receiving ministry, lives changed on both sides of the giving and receiving.

Pastor Myron Hairston and his wife Carol taught us a lot about living by faith and prayer as they hosted us at Victory Praise and Worship Church.

Coming from churches all over New England, some sacrificed vacations and summer jobs to come to rebuild homes and restore hope to those ravaged by hurricane Katrina. Gilda, from Rumford, committed to come even though she didn't have a job. God provided a job that even gave her paid time to come. She donated that week's salary to the project. Joe, from South Weymouth, was in the hospital the night before we left with back pain from an old injury. He still came, and his determination, prayer and encouragement inspired us all.

Sunday our team ministered at the Victory and Praise Church, our hosts for the week. Martha Wilson preached, and the team ministered through puppets, drama, and a choir. The service was anointed of the Holy Spirit as we prayed around the altar.

Later Sunday we were joined by teams from all over the United States, some 300 teens and adults, serving with Mission Encounter in a summer of ministry. Now we understood the gym arrangements as we spilled out into the annex and church itself, sharing four showers and one bathroom each for the men and women!

During the week TESS divided into three teams two for construction, and one doing VBS at the church. We replaced insulation, drywall, roofing, did painting

and clean up. Most of all we heard the stories of the ones we came to help -- water up to the roof, escaping on boats, evacuating loved ones, and the loss of so much.

Bob had recent heart bypass surgery and needed help in putting his house back together. He showed us his miracle Bible sitting on the top shelf, surrounded by water damaged books, but untouched. And he told of getting his mother-in-law out just ahead of the rising water. Story after story.

Stacey showed up one afternoon, soon to be evicted from her home. We counseled with her, and she returned for Ladies Night Out when the teens showered the ladies with lots of pampering.

VBS provided significant caring for children who had lost so much. There is so little for them. Mission Encounter is planning a special Christmas project for them. Can we go again?

## Bulgaria Team Build a Church in Stubel

A Work and Witness team of ten members, seven from the Wollaston Church and three from the Rutland, VT Church traveled to Bulgaria from June 19-29. Our project was to assist the nationals in building a church building in the village of Stubel. The foundation and partial walls were there when we arrived. The walls were completed and the cement columns were poured. Forms were put in place to pour cement for the ceiling support.

The churches in Montana and Stubel hosted a sausage bar-b-que for us one evening. We, in turn, taught them how to make s'mores. They thought it was great fun. In Sophia we had the opportunity to visit the site of a purposed ministry center and do a prayer walk for its future development. Relationships were sweet with the church people and our fellow Bulgarians workers. They will be remembered in our thoughts and

prayers.

### Duxbury Work & Witness Trip to Guatemala All They Hoped It Would Be

Hola, me iglesia! Dios les bendiga todo! (Hello, my church! God bless you all!)

Several times over the course of the missions trip we sang the Doxology together, and usually our Central American team members followed in Spanish – what a blessing that was! Praise God from whom all blessings flow! I feel as if my life is overflowing with blessings right now! This trip was everything I'd hoped it would be and more.

The weather was not terribly hot, they fed us like queens and kings, our accommodations were more comfortable than expected -- and 41 adults and over 400 children accepted Christ! It was truly a life-changing experience. We: welded and bent and cut steel for church buildings, saw one of the buildings practically finished, drove over winding mountain roads with very scary drivers, shopped at an open market, taught about 600 children how to brush their teeth, helped Dr. Rivas treat 300 individuals or families through 2 medical clinics, painted the outside of two medical clinics, worked closely with many pastors and with laypeople from the Chicujau mission, showed the Jesus Film three times, led three VBS-type programs (including puppets), worshipped at two different churches and shared in music and with puppets, got to know our 5 other teammates, 3 from El Salvador and 2 from the US, toured the MAC Region central offices,

# New England District Work & Witness 2006 Ulyanovsk, Russia

On July 19<sup>th</sup> seven people from five churches on the New England District left on a 10 hour journey by plane to Moscow. This was followed the next day by a17-hour train trip to Ulyanovsk, which is located approximately 500 miles east and slightly south of Moscow. This trip marks the ten-year anniversary of the district's involvement in God's work in Russia.

The congregation is led by Pastor Masha and her son Maxim.

In January of this year we expected to have 15 people go with us. However, God was in control, people were faithful in their giving and here we were.

Words cannot adequately describe the week. Let us tell you of the work and changes we observed. Cleaning undergrowth; mucking out debris - some of the ugliest mud imaginable; hauling sand, bricks, water, and cement (110lb bags!); mixing 5 ton of mortar on the foundation slab; filling hundreds of feet of very large gaps between cement blocks; and laying more than 2000 bricks.

What is impossible to describe is the fellowship we shared with each other and especially the Russian people. God's love and the love of His people is

everywhere. God is working through His people in Ulyanovsk.

Sonya, our interpreter, was lovingly referred to by various names, such as "Sweetie Pie" and "Muscles." Sweetie Pie because she is one of the sweetest people you could ever meet and Muscles because she carried 4 bricks to everyone else's 3 and did the work of 2 people though she is just a lovely 5'1" young woman.

She first came in contact with the Nazarene Church in St. Petersburg in 1999 at age 12. At the Summer Camp at the Training Center in 2002 she led a group of 15 youth on the 8-hour over night train ride (not trains as we know them!) from St. Petersburg. She served as a counselor at the Camp. At nineteen she is starting her junior year on a scholarship at the European Bible College in Switzerland.

She is one of 11 children with alcoholic parents who were unable to care for the family. At 12 she was supporting her 6 younger brothers and sisters. The state finally took the children away from the parents about four years ago. Four of her younger siblings are still in an orphanage and Sonya herself has no place to call home. I hope someday you will have a chance to hear her testimony. God has a plan for her life and she is committed to the ministry in Russia. We are all certain she will have a major impact for Christ.

We also met neighborhood boys who remembered us from 2004 and came to visit us where we stayed. There was a steady stream of children of all ages past the work site. They represent the greatest opportunity for reaching Ulyanovsk for Christ and there is no better location or better people than Pastor Masha and her flock.

We left Ulyanovsk with many emotions. There was a great feeling of accomplishment at the amount of work our small team had done. There was great encouragement knowing that a local contractor would use the money we brought to continue the work right after we left to close off the basement and add

the next two levels. There was a feeling of loss at having to leave our friends. And there was a resolve to return and see the job completed. Join us in 2008! In the meantime we will be raising money to help get the roof on and make sure that Sonya completes her education. If all goes well she will graduate in 2008.




