

From My Heart

How does a person pack decades of promoting missions through Nazarene Missions International (NMI) into a few short paragraphs? What a thrill it has been to serve on local, district, and general NMI councils, and to carry out the tasks of general NMI director for almost 20 years (March 1986—July 2005)!

So many people have mentored me over the years and, thus, contributed to making NMI what it is today. One that stands foremost was Dr. Louise Robinson Chapman. From her, I learned that by keeping my expectations of districts, churches, and leaders high, they would rise to the challenge. I tapped into her wisdom on many occasions.

I am thankful for the people on the district and local levels. It has been hard work like yours that has kept missions in front of churches for 90 years! You make all the difference in the world. Leaders, you have promoted the emphases and special projects of NMI. While the General NMI Office provided resources for you, it was your creativity, determination, and passion that accomplished so much. In reviewing statistics in the time I have served as your director, annual missions giving increased from \$30 million to \$62 million! And this, during a

time of economic challenges when many mission agencies are having to bring missionaries home or at least curb the number of missionaries going out. Many new prayer initiatives, projects, and

events propelled us in the mission.

The world population increases at a rate of approximately 75 million people a year. To put this into more manageable numbers, 3 babies are born each second. Of the approximately 6.4 billion people in the world, approximately 1 billion are between the ages of 15 and 24.* We have a responsibility to these billion of people, both those nearby and those on the other side of the globe. We must continue to:

- Pray for the salvation, for the world's needs, for the persecuted church, and for God's servants around the world. Only as we bend our knees will we be strengthened for the task.
- Learn so we are more aware of those who need Christ in the world, desiring to make a difference in their lives. We can't affect the world if we do not understand the world's hurts and needs.
- Involve children and youth in missions in your

- church. Let them learn early in their lives how important their roles are as global Christians.
- Give to missions. NMI has never apologized for receiving an offering, because we are striving for the "big picture," the salvation of souls.
- Challenge others. If you
 model the NMI objectives to your churches
 and expect them to join
 you in the effort—not out
 of duty, but out of
 passion inspired from
 their love of the Lord—
 then they will stand
 side-by-side with you.

I am entering a new chapter in my life—one that will require constant strength, unending wisdom, and God's power. Your prayerful support will be greatly appreciated and vital to this new area of ministry.

While I will no longer serve as general NMI director, this organization and World Mission will continue to be dear to my heart. I will watch with anticipation what NMI people around the world accomplish in the future. I will cheer all of you on to continue praying, learning, mentoring the next generation, giving, and going.

2005 General NMI Convention—The 20th General NMI Convention was held June 21-25 in Indianapolis, Indiana. Highlights included the theme presentation service, and General NMI Director Nina Gunter's challenge to participants regarding the new quadrennial theme—"The Cross: Seize it! Share it!"

NMI Web Site Redesigned—The totally redesigned NMI Web site was unveiled in June 2005. The new site offers a wealth of valuable resources for church leaders. Check out the all-new NMI Web site at www.nazarenemissions.org.

"Books for Pastors" Update—As of April 30, \$1.3 million have been given toward the NMI 90th Anniversary Project: "Books for Pastors—Tools for Ministry." Phil Hamner, senior pastor of Overland Park Church of the Nazarene in Kansas, sensed God calling him to respond to the need for Wesleyan-Holiness resource materials for pastors in world mission regions. As a personal commitment, Pastor Hamner announced to his local congregation that he and his wife would match the amount they give toward "Books for Pastors."

First Church Organized in São Tomé— The first Church of the Nazarene was recently dedicated in the coastal community of Ribeira Peixe in the Church of the Nazarene pioneer area of São Tomé.

Out of Africa

WMB Launches New Program in PNG—A new World Mission Broadcast (WMB) radio program launched in Papua New Guinea (PNG) in May. The program, called Cry of the Women, deals with issues relevant to women in PNG, while sharing The hope of Jesus Christ. Please pray that the Holy Spirit will use this new program in a powerful way to lead women to Christ. World Mission Broadcast

Receives Grant—Community of Hope (COH), a Compassionate Ministries Center in Washington D.C., was recently awarded a federal grant. The COH Health Clinic is the only clinic operating at a D.C. elementary school and is also the only health-care facility operating in any D.C. school that is open to the public. In 2003, a total of 5,300 visits were made to the Community of Hope clinic.

Nazarene Compassionate Ministries (NCM)

Firsts" for the CIS Field-The

Common-wealth of Independent States (CIS) Field recently experienced several "firsts." Jhanbollat Mamishev was ordained at the Central Asia District assembly, becoming the first member of the Church of the Nazarene in Kazakstan to be ordained. At the Ukraine District assembly, the first Ukrainian and Armenian pastors were ordained—Volodymyr Massyuk (Ukraine) and Karen Khachatryan (Armenia). Eurasia Region

New College Presidents Elected—The presidents of three Nazarene educational institutions will retire in 2005, which prompted the election of three new presidents: MidAmerica Nazarene University—Dr. Ed Robinson; Trevecca Nazarene University—Dr. Dan Boone; Eastern Nazarene College—Dr. Corlis McGee. McGee will be the first female president of any of the eight Nazarene colleges in the United States.

Tsunami Aid—A team of Thailand District youth and pastors, along with Nazarene missionaries Tomo and Ceny Hirahara, ministered in the Thai village of BangNiang, Thailand, that was affected by the December 2004 tsunami disaster. Local residents greeted the team with great enthusiasm. Ceny Hirahara reported that one tsunami victim joyfully exclaimed, "You fulfilled your promise! You came back!" as she hugged her, referring to a previous disaster aid and ministry trip they made in February. NCM

WORLD SCENE

Unreached People Groups Increasing—Accor-ding to the World Christian Database, the estimated number of unreached people groups has increased from 10,000 in 1995 to 13,000 in 2005.

Churches Using the Web—According to a recent survey, 90 percent of churches in

the United States use e-mail, and a large percentage of those have a presence on the World Wide Web. Researchers claim that many people will try to locate a church via the Internet—if they can't find it or don't like what they see, they will most likely never visit the church. The Barna Group

Bangladesh—In Dhaka, the capital of Bangladesh, the Salvation Army has a yearlong program dedicated to rescue women from the sex industry. Rescued women are given counseling and encouragement and receive skills training in handcrafts to help them find employment.

Church Around the World

Tsunami Survivors—About 1.5 million children—dubbed the "Tsunami Generation" by UNICEF—were orphaned, or lost one parent, or were otherwise adversely affected by the December 2004 tsunami that slammed into more than 10 countries bordering the Indian Ocean. According to WebMD, half the children exposed to the catastrophe may suffer from post-traumatic stress disorder, a rate about 20 percent higher than in adults.

Finding God in Jordan—Samaritan's Purse helped one of Jordan's leading evangelical churches buy a former school and convert it into a community center that includes a medical clinic for refugees, classrooms to teach English, and a coffee shop. All the facilities are staffed by church members who are allowed to share the gospel on the premises. The activities draw hundreds of people who would never attend a church. Samaritan's Purse


Camp News

School Pal-Paks



A School Pal-Pak will serve two students. Prepare School Pal-Paks in boxes of 10. Each box of 10 will serve 20 children.

The cost of each Pal-Pak is approximately \$10.00. This is only \$5.00 per child.

Packing Instructions:

1. Gather NEW items in quantities listed below. Assemble Paks and seal the zip-lock bags. Include only those items listed on the inventory.

Pack contents below into a 1 gallon zip-loc bag:

- 2 MEAD or composition notebooks
- 1 package of 10-12 #2 pencils
- 1 package of 10-12 black pens
- 2 pink erasers, 2-3" long
- 2 6Ó rulers (with metric)
- 1 package of 12-15 colored pencils
- 1 pair of blunt-nosed scissors
- 1 hand-held pencil sharpener

These contents will give each student a composition notebook, 5-6 pencils, 5-6 pens, an eraser, and a ruler. Two students will share the colored pencils, sharpener, and scissors.

- 2. Fill each 12"x12"x12" box (which can be purchased at an office supply store) with 10 Paks—no more, no less.
- 3. Do not insert literature (including anything with the church's name on it, notes, etc.) in the Paks or boxes.
- 4. Please put both "To" and "From" addresses on the box.
